

# **DNR** to close **Upper Sioux** Agency **State Park** next month **By Brian Mozev** Staff Writer

announced last week that it permanently will close Upper Sioux Agency State Park to the public on Friday, Feb. 16. The closure is one of the final steps in transferring the park to the Upper Sioux Community.

The 1,300-acre slice of property will be open to visitors until 10 p.m. on Feb. 15, 2024. Once it's closed, there will be no public access and no services available. A press release from the agency stated that gates will be closed, facilities will be locked, informational and wayfinding signs will be removed, and trails won't be maintained.

The DNR hosted a press conference at 9:30 a.m. on Jan. 10 to discuss the closure as well

# DNR to seek input on teal hunt, season splits

Bemidji, Minn. - The Minnesota DNR is preparing to roll out a general waterfowl-hunter survey. It's an effort to collect information on a range of topics, most notably hunter opinions on an early September teal season and the state's three-tier hunting-zone system.

The agency, which conducts such surveys roughly every three years, is slated to mail 4,000 survey postcards this week to randomly selected



waterfowl hunters who purchased state duck stamps last year. Steve Cordts, Minnesota DNR waterfowl staff specialist, said the goal is to get an overall response rate as high as possible.

"It's the best way we have to gather information and keep a pulse on what waterfowl hunters are thinking, so it's important," Cordts said of the regular waterfowl-hunter surveys. "We encourage those who get a survey ... to fill it out and send it back as soon as possible. I filled it out twice as a test, and it took me between five and six minutes to complete."

Now, Netland said, there are multiple reports of fishers each year and sightings have increased steadily. Many citizens don't recognize fishers and think they're wolverines or another member of the mustelid (weasel) family, he said.

Along with fishers, bobcats are being seen more often in southern Minnesota. Each animal species has a different path to reach the region, but both are forming larger populations.

"We're seeing (bobcats) in the Minnesota River valley more
